





- supports new approaches to LLW management



Southeast Compact Commissioners


- Appointed by Governors of member states

for Low-Level Radioactive Waste Management

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Most state radiation control laws require protection of the public and the environment from <u>all</u> sources of radiation.




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Statement by Conference of Radiation Control Directors, May 20, 1985:


"CRCPD has...concluded that the use of NARM is commonplace and widespread throughout the country, and that...control over NARM is quite varied and fragmented. This fragmentary control creates confusion on the part of the users and waste generators, and creates a real potential for excessive radiation exposure to both the radiation worker and the general public."



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"...members of the CRCPD recommend that the
Congress of the United States amend the Atomic
Energy Act of 1954 to authorize the Nuclear
Regulatory Commission to regulate and control
discrete sources of Naturally Occurring and
Accelerator-Produced Radioactive Material
(NARM) in a similar manner as other radioactive
material identified in the Act."




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Big Effort, Big Money -- Little Risk

Little Effort, Little Money -- Big Risk




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Radiation is Radiation


Make decisions based on the radiation in the material and <u>not</u> based on the regulatory "box" of the material



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One Standard for <u>ALL</u> Radioactive Materials




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


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To be successfully implemented, Committee on LAW recommendations for alternative approaches must reflect:
